INDUSTRY PERFORMANCE UPDATES²

After struggling to keep pace with global benchmarks in the first half of July, hedge funds were able to post modest gains in the back half of the month. According to data collected by Morgan Stanley, North American based Long/Short equity funds led the way, with the cohort posting gains of 1.3% the last week of the month, representing over 45% of the gains seen in the S&P 500 (through 7/28). While still positive, the average Global hedge fund was only up 0.8% last week, compared to the MSCI AC World Index up 2.1%. For the month of July, the average Global hedge fund was up 1.1% (vs. the MSCI AC World up 5.8%), bringing YTD performance to -3.8%. The average North America based Long/Short equity fund fared better than their Global counterparts in July, returning 3.4% vs. the S&P 500 Index up 7.7% (through 7/28). Despite stronger relative performance in July, the average North American based Long/Short equity fund is still down nearly 9% for the year. In other regions, European based funds posted modest gains, bringing YTD performance within the cohort to down slightly less than 1%. In relative terms, the cohort struggled in July after coming into the month as the top performer YTD, posting gains of less than 0.2% despite the Euro STOXX 600 index rallying nearly 6.5% (through 7/28). Crowded hedge fund shorts in Europe weighed on returns as they were up 6% in July, which came at a time when single-name short exposure in the region was hovering near ~2 year highs. Asia based hedge funds also struggled to keep up with markets the last week of the month, finishing July down roughly 0.30%.

As it relates to market flows, hedge funds continued to trim gross exposure globally, though active de-grossing was lighter than amounts seen earlier in the month. According to Morgan Stanley, most of the active de-grossing took place on the short side, with hedge funds covering short positions in most regions. Looking at the long side of portfolios, selling was largest in Asia. On the leverage front, de-grossing was largely offset by mark-to-market gains, which resulted in gross leverage across North American based Long/Short funds being unchanged week-over-week at 185%. Net leverage was similarly unchanged at 44%, which was in-line with the highest levels Morgan Stanley has seen over the past ~2.5 months (after falling to 35% in mid-June). Looking at net activity, hedge funds were small net buyers of North American equities, most of which was driven by the covering of index-level shorts. In addition to ETFs, Morgan Stanley also saw hedge funds continue to buy Utilities on a net basis, which came after the sector had been net sold 9 of the past 10 weeks ending July 15th. Hedge funds were also net buyers of Healthcare, most of which came from long additions in Biotech and Pharma. Conversely, hedge funds tilted towards selling Technology, Media and Telecommunications ("TMT") related industries, with Software, Media and Semis accounting for the bulk of the net selling. In addition to TMT, hedge funds were also net sellers of Energy (long selling) and Materials.
